Pipeline opposition group meeting tonight in Sherbrooke

The Estrie group Goldboro, Parlonsen! will hold an information session this evening, Friday, Nov. 15 at 6:30 pm at Baobab Café in Sherbrooke regarding the construction of a new natural gas pipeline between Alberta and Nova Scotia, planning to run through the south of Quebec.

Goldboro, Parlons-en! opposes the pipeline.

The purpose of the event, according to the group, is to inform citizens of the

region on the environmental consequences of this project.

According to the group, the transmission of gas from Alberta to Nova Scotia would require the expansion of the Trans Québec-Maritime (TQM) and the Portland Natural Gas Transmission System (PNGTS) lines.

The TQM, in its Montreal to East Hereford portion, is already operating at its full capacity of 200 million cubic feet per day, while the terminal's supply would require 1.3 billion.

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request. Today, I tabled a motion for the Committee on Institutions to seize its oversight power and hear from the BEI's Director on the organization's orientations, activities and management, but it was defeated. Ms. Giauque retires in January: we have a window of opportunity of only a few weeks if we want to question her. I'm afraid the government won't give us the opportunity," Leduc commented.

"In her report, Madeleine Giauque states that she believes that the BEI's impartiality and independence will be severely tested in the coming years. This is very

worrying for an institution that was created precisely to remove any suspicion of investigations into events involving a police force. This would require all parliamentarians to have the opportunity to hear it and question it in order to ensure that the BEI's mission is achieved. It is important to take action to restore public confidence in our police forces," the MNA for Hochelaga-Maisonneuve said.

While a reform of the BEI is on the legislative agenda, Leduc called on the government not to act unilaterally without allowing parliamentarians to hear from Giauque before she leaves.
