The Missisquoi North Volunteer Centre (CABMN) in Mansonville has long offered, among its many services, a sick room lending equipment service, where persons recuperating following surgery or illness can borrow wheelchairs, walkers, toilet seats, canes and more free of charge. A simple call to the office and those assisting someone needing to borrow equipment will find it easy to access what they need.

A recent client coming in to borrow a wheelchair commented that her friend

was not sure what she was going to do with her time while she was on the mend and asked if CAB staff had any suggestions. From this inquiry another idea was born.

Canadian mystery novel author Louise Penny was approached and asked if she would consider donating a set of her novels that centre on the work of francophone Chief Inspector Armand Gamache of the Sûreté du Québec and the people of Three Pines, and Penny was quick to support the initiative; not only donating a set of novels but some audio books as well.

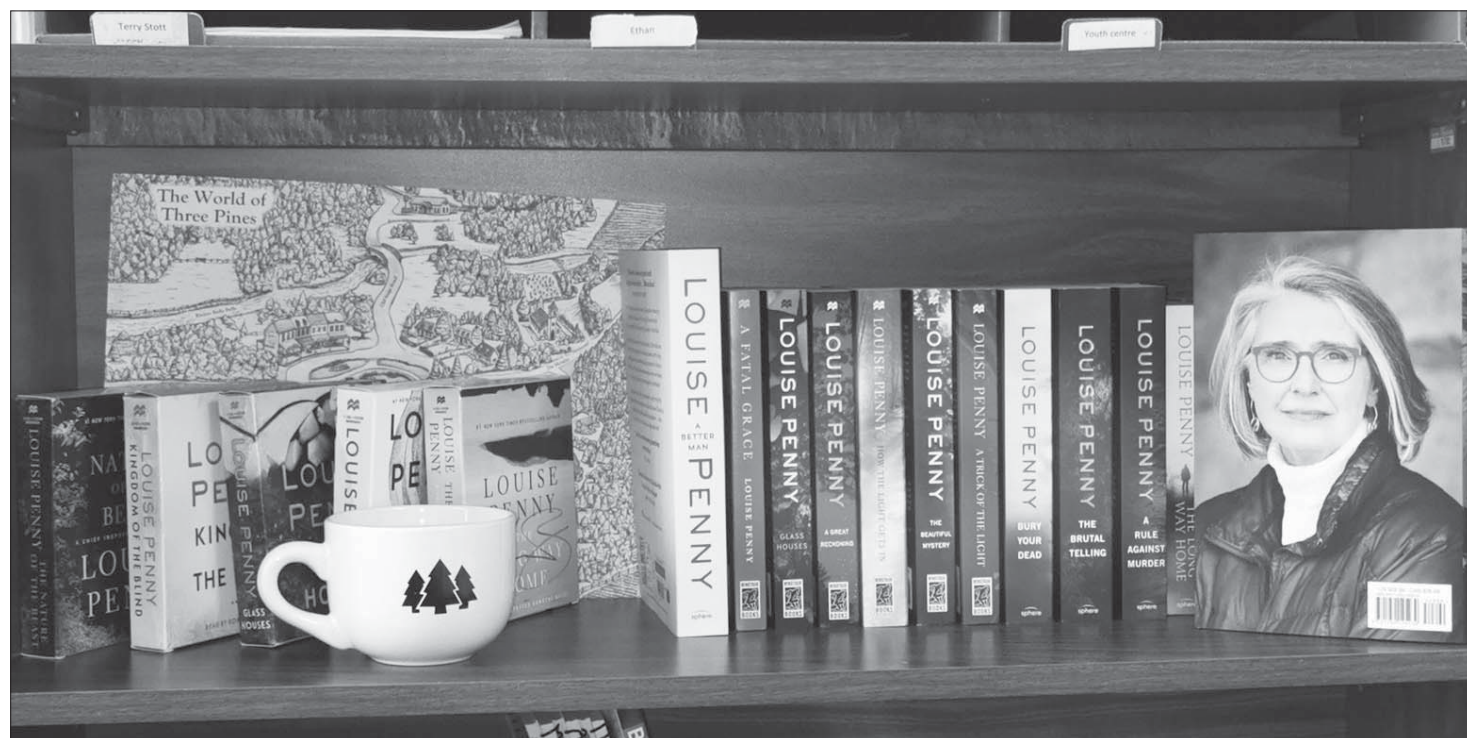
The "I'm F.I.N.E. Recuperating Library" of the CABMN features a copy of each of Penny's novels: Still Life, A Fatal Grace/Dead Cold, The Cruellest Month, A Rule Against Murder/The Murder Stone, The Brutal Telling, Bury Your Dead, A Trick of the Light, The Beautiful Mystery, How the Light Gets In, The Long Way Home, The Nature of the Beast, The Great Reckoning, Glass Houses, Kingdom of the Blind, A Better Man and her latest, All the Devils Are Here. The novels can be signed out in a process similar to that

of a library. Those who fall in love with the books are encouraged to purchase their own copies at Brome Lake Books in Knowlton.

For the extremely talented Penny who resides in the vicinity, her kindness is a testament to her gratitude in her deep awareness of how lucky she feels to be writing, and published and successful. Before being published she was a journalist with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

For those who are avid followers of Penny's novels, the name given to the CAB recuperating library will bring a smile.
