élène's Fund was created following the death of Hélène Forget, a resident of Sutton who loved children. Hélène was like a second mom to many of her sibling's children and played a vital role in the lives of her nieces and nephews as well as many others both family and friend.

Affectionately known as, Ma Tante Hélène (Aunt Hélène)," by her family, this is a perfect way to honor her memory.

Hélène was a long-time member of the Sutton Legion and she was often seen at the Foyer Sutton Foyer helping with the elderly.

She and her mom would knit mittens and hats for the homeless and her strong belief and devotion to family life made her well aware of the lack of family that others might face. After a short battle with cancer, Hélène died in 2014 at the age of 71.

Her siblings started the donations made toward this fund in hopes that something could be done in her memory that would make a difference to youth, parents and families; even if only in some small way.

As in all towns and cities at various times, parents can find it difficult to make ends meet, let alone find money for "extras" that kids sometimes need. Families cannot always afford to send their children to activities that are positive and needed in a child's life.

ith the 2015-2016 school registration year right around the corner, Mansonville Elementary School is proud to share some information about what they have to offer at the "little school with the big heart."

"Many changes and improvements have been made throughout the past school year," explains MES secretary, Tara Graves.

'We have a dynamic team that looks to make our school a welcoming bilingual environment as we strive for excellence and recognize every child's potential."

Mansonville Elementary offers a bilingual pre-kindergarten program for four-year-olds on Wednesdays and Thursdays, all day between 8:05 a.m. and 2:15 p.m.

The school boasts small class sizes; intervention plans adapted to student's individual needs, a daily breakfast program, an iPad for each student in Grade 3 and up, project based learning/experiential learning, performing arts and a ski program. The list goes

"It is because of all of the wonderful things that we offer and the many dedicated staff members that we have grown from 21 to 34 students," said Graves. "We care about the students that we teach," she added.

Last year, the school held an open house for all students with English eligibility and they did the same again this year last Friday, for ages 3 and up.

Various activities were planned for those 3 to 4 years old throughout the morning with the school's Pre-Kindergarten, Kindergarten and Cycle 1 [Grades 1 and 2] students.

The registration period for 2015-2016 school year continues to Feb. 6 and those interested can stop by the school anytime to pick up a registration package.
