## Lennoxville road work on the way

ast week the City of Sherbrooke announced a series of projects that will be moving forward in 2016 thanks to an investment of \$3.2 million into the road budgets. Though none of the star projects of that announcement were in Lennoxville, the borough will see some significant repairs and resurfacing projects come out of the new funding.

Minor patching, repaving, or gravel resurfacing work is set to take place on sections of des Rigoles street, the Moulton Hill Terrace, Moulton Hill, Fearon road, Riverview, Bartlett, Glenday, Mitchell, Lee-Langlois, and Haskell Hill roads.

According to Borough President David Price, however, Lennoxville can also expect some significant public works projects out of the new funding.

"What is coming up soon is Speid between Hunting and the pumping station," Price said, explaining that the water and sewage pipes on that section of the street need to be redone and, as a result, the surface of the road will be remade as well. The work is set to take place between Lorne and Meade Streets.

Though the city had previously committed to repaving Samuel-Gratham Street from Queen to Connolly this coming summer, Price said that the work might not happen until later on because the project was expanded after having qualified for a government grant. Though people in the area will now have to wait longer to see the work done, the repaving and installation of new pipes will now also include the northern end of Connolly Street

"The possibility is that it might not even be done this summer," the Borough President said, "but the trade is that much more work is going to be done."

Price noted that many of the roads that are being patched were in great need, although he added that he would
