Musée des beaux-arts benefits from museum money

uc Fortin, member of the national assembly for Sherbrooke and Quebec's Minister of Culture and Communications announced on Friday that the government will be providing \$626,016 to the Musée des Beaux Arts de Sherbrooke over the next three years in support for renovation and upkeep projects. In 2016-17 the museum will receive \$222,600 that will go towards

"The Sherbrooke Fine Arts Museum is an important cultural site in the city of Sherbrooke," Fortin said "Thanks to this support, the museum will be able to improve and maintain its services in the coming years."

Cecile Gelinas, museum director, said that the news is really coming at the right time, as the heritage building is showing definite and concerning signs of its age.

"The museum is in real need of attention," Gelinas, listing work on the roof, the foundations, the masonry and the heating systems as all being among the projects to be funded by the new grant.

Though the money has been committed specifically for current and necessary repair work, Fortin described the funding as a kind of prologue to a long term transformation of the museum, giving a nod to the recent revelation that the MBAS is looking to expand its building in the near future.
