



## Sherbrooke hit by mini arson wave

A large plume of smoke overhung the car repair shop located at 6312 Saint-Élie Road but no injuries were reported.

Damage is estimated at \$175,000.

According to witness reports, a snowmobile stored inside the garage caught fire around 9:30 p.m. before spreading to the rest of the building.

The file was transferred to the Sherbrooke Police when evidence suggested hundred meters away.

A passerby contacted emergency ser- that the fire could have been purposely set. The investigation was still underway on Sunday and no suspect had been arrested

On Friday evening, a criminal fire broke out around 8:30 p.m. at 412 Galt West in downtown Sherbrooke, just hours after the SPS released the main suspect from another criminal fire that morning in a building located just a

The suspect in that case a homeless person who squatted in abandoned buildings and sought to warm himself, had previously been released under a promise to appear. He was arrested again because he had not respected his conditions of release and confirmed that he was the author of the second fire.

He was still detained on Sunday while waiting to appear at the Sherbrooke Courthouse Monday morning.
