"He was the only one with "credentials" to climb a ladder," laughed Ball. "We named him the "siding repairman" upon arrival and he

did a wonderful job," Ball added.

For Ball, he felt proud to be considered as a part of the team assembled and how much they all accomplished. He admitted that it was great to see the Youth Centre clean again but reflected as follows on the experience.

"The youth all looked so much older and Eleanor and I got to hear about their teachers, schooling online, triumphs and failures and for a couple of hours everything seemed normal but looking up at the masked faces, reality struck that, I could not see their smiles," said Ball. "I long for the days when we can gather and feel safe and for a time when Eleanor, who helped organize and orchestrate the entire day and I can be with the youth again without worrying how close we stand and to get back to what matters most, the kids."
