The Cowansville warming centre is open on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 5 pm to 9 pm at 101 Albert Street, Suite 1002. The Farnham warming centre is open on Mondays and Thursdays from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. It is located at 151 rue Principale East. They are advertised as helping places where people can go to get warm and to rest.

The centres are an initiative from the comite en itinerance

with the financial help of the MRC Brome-Missisquoi, the Desjardins comtes Jean, Centraide, Charest Foundation, Isabelle the provincial representative for Brome-Missisquoi, Uniprix, and the health services network covering Sherbrooke and the Brome Missisquoi area.

As inflation increases and all essential items rise in cost, it becomes more and more difficult for people in marginal financial situations to be able to manage. In October Cowansville had an event, Night of the Homeless, to raise awareness of the homelessness situation, poverty and disaffiliation. It was organized through the Living Room/Espace
