produced both a professional exhibition and a beautiful book in French and English containing the photos and write-ups on the seniors who participated in the project.

The opening day of the exhibition was attended by over 100 invited guests including many of those who participated in the project and their families as well as guests who had contributed in some way. The setup of the room was both impeccable and inviting with a lovely array of refreshments served including delicious cheeses donated by La fromagerie Saint-Benoit-du-Lac in support of the exhibit and project.

Amongst Friday's guests was 91-year-old, Paul-Emile Fiola who was interviewed for the project by Madeleine Langlois and photographed by John Patterson. A small portion of the text about his life reads, "Paul-Emile was born in Verdun, a Montreal suburb and like many Montrealers, since the 1960's spent his family vacations in the Eastern Townships. For Mr.Fiola and his family this was at the Camping Havre des Iles in Potton."

Madeleine Langlois summed up her heartfelt words about her friend, Paul-Emile by saying:

"When you get to know Paul-Emile, you immediately see that he has had a full life, surrounded by his wife and family who have always been the center of his world. He has enjoyed his work life and he has built lasting relationships by being involved in his community. This is what we call "a life well lived."

Saturday, Jan. 21, the second day of the exhibit was open to the public from morning to late afternoon. Saturday saw approximately 70 visitors in attendance including people from out of town. Potton Mayor, Bruno Cote attended the event both days and enthusiastically said the following regarding the exhibit

"This project celebrates people who contribute and have contributed to our community. Attending the exhibit reminds us of the pride we feel as Potton residents,

The twenty plus Potton residents interviewed whether born and raised in the township or who choose to make Potton their home combined to make a diverse and interesting exhibit of stories, faces and experiences.
