n the fall of 2022 I shared a story with Record readers about a fundraiser held by the Missisquoi North Volunteer Centre (CABMN) following the donation of an autographed player jersey received from the Montreal Canadiens hockey team and an additional monetary contribution through the received Montreal Canadiens Children's Foundation that would allow for the purchase of ice skates for every student who registered in each of the two local elementary schools in Potton.

The Montreal Canadiens Children's Foundation community grants are presented annually to charitable organizations supporting youth sports programming in low-income areas across the province. The CABMN applied for funding wanting to assure that as many children as possible be able to enjoy the rink located in the multi-functional shelter situated in the Parc Andre Gagnon in the northern sector of the village. The fundraising was merely one part of bringing the project to fruition. Coordinating with the two local elementary schools to determine sizes, types of skates and communication with parents as well as abundant coordination with a sports store in Sherbrooke to assure order possibilities for such a large number of pairs of skates and more details all required time and effort. Once the skates arrived, the process of determining any wrong sizes, missing pairs or other issues had to be dealt with.

The final delivery resulting in the completion of the skates to students happened last week. The youth own their skates and have them to use for school and community outdoor fun days as well as giving them the opportunity to go to the community rink to skate whenever they wish. There has been some amazing feedback from the parents, the school personnel and the children.
