If last year's camp is any indication, the youth can be assured that the experience will be vast, detailed and delivered with motivation, inspiration and pride by the members of the Firefighter/First Responder team as well as others solicited to offer training and support.

There is an old adage that's origin is debated that says, "Give a man a fish, and you feed him for a day. Teach a man to fish, and you feed him for a lifetime."

By implicating these young people in not merely watching rescues and safety procedures from a distance or on a film but rather living them and taking part in their outcome, the Potton Fire Department is teaching these youth and feeding their interests, experiences and creating pride in taking part in the saving of lives. Hands on experience will allow youth to know if these varied types of safety services are of interest to them and whether or not they might want to pursue them further as they study, choose a career path or get involved in a community rescue department in the future.

There is something quite moving in watching a 12-year-old helping a team mate during a simulation to exit a body from an accident or battle a blaze with a hose heavier than can be imagined. Tired out returning to the station to learn that even in their exhaustion, things must be cleaned and put in their place ready for the next potential emergency.

Camp 911 builds confidence, increases skills and knowledge as well as boosting the self-esteem. Heroes come in all sizes and Potton is confident that each year will bring a team of young people that the community can be very proud of.
