# Mansonville Exploratory walk activity demonstrates collaboration and community awareness

The Missisquoi North Volunteer Centre (CABMN) senior services (SAPA) and Youth Centre staff team recently collaborated with the Centre des Femmes Memphremagog, the UMIC (Mobile Community Intervention Unit) team via the Memphremagog Hospital Foundation and community participants who took part in a walk around the village of Mansonville as late afternoon turned to early evening to identify and discuss any safety concerns raised at various locations and checkpoints throughout the walk.

The walk took place on Thursday, Nov. 23 starting just after 4 p.m. at the youth centre (282 Principale) where the UMIC bus was parked with animators available to exchange and provide information to the public and attendees on a variety of topics, organizations and service resources in the region. A diversified group ranging in ages gathered and they and organizers set out, flashlights in hand for their exploratory walk. Concerns about problematic crosswalks with blind spots and dimly lit areas topped the list of issues noted. Tips were shared on being mindful when walking through the village.

Following the walk where the group exchanged on a variety of ways to improve safety, all returned to the Youth Centre where the Magog guests prepared delicious hot chocolate served from the UMIC bus and the youth centre complimented with homemade cookies for all to enjoy.
