Senior's Christmas lunch in Potton spreads holiday cheer

n Wednesday, Dec. 13, the Missisquoi North Volunteer Centre (CABMN) Senior Services program held its Annual Christmas lunch for seniors at the basement of the Mansonville Catholic Church (now a space managed by the Municipality of Potton). The ambiance in the room was perfect with the tables decorated and a festive fire burning on the big projection screen.

Thanks to funding obtained from the CIUSSSE-CHUS "Réseau des Éclaireurs" funds that aim to support communities in offering activities to improve psychological health and create resilience, caring and supportive communities, the CABMN was able to get a subsidy that contributed to the costs of the event making it more than affordable for most seniors who wished to participate and attend.

Since the beginning of 2021, the Ministère de la santé et des services sociaux du Québec has mandated the CIUSSS de l'Estrie-CHUS to deploy the « Éclaireurs en santé psychologique » network in its territory. Since 2022, several projects have been funded to support organizations in activities aimed at the well-being, resilience and psychosocial recovery of individuals and communities throughout the Estrie region. The CABMN received support for the Senior Christmas lunch as well as a subsidy to aid the CABMN youth centre home economics program at the youth centre. This program allows the animators to do a weekly cooking group with the youth ages 5-12 and the kids get to take home some of their weekly culinary creations to share with their families.

At the Dec. 13 senior Christmas Party close to 120 attendees enjoyed a traditional Christmas dinner with turkey, meatballs, tortiere, potatoes, vegetables, rolls, salads and delicious



desserts prepared and served by La Falaise d'Orford. Each attendee found a homemade cookie from Melange Maison d'Austin at his or her place setting to take home to enjoy. Wine was served and the Chouette Chorale performed a few Christmas Carols for all to enjoy. After lunch, volunteer Lucie Maurer provided ambiance music and some people even got up to dance.

"It is clear that the goal of the Reseau des Eclaireurs funding is needed," said Angelle Laplume who has worked with seniors at the CABMN for over 30 years. "Never have we seen so many people sign up for this type of event that doubled in attendance from all previous years," she added.

Public sector negotiations

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front, including unions representing teachers, school support staff and health-care system employees.

Those deals only cover working conditions, however, and negotiations pertaining to compensation and benefits are still underway at the common front's central bargaining table.

The alliance has carried out several multi-day strikes in the last two months and is threatening an unlimited walkout in the new year unless it reaches an agreement with the government.

It has not said when such a strike would begin.

Separate unions representing around 66,000 teachers and 80,000 health-care workers were not among the groups that reached a deal with the government before Christmas. The Federation autonome de l'enseignement and Federation interprofessionnelle de la sante du Quebec are negotiating independently with the government. The teachers union has been on an unlimited strike since Nov. 23, closing about 800 schools for four weeks before the holiday break, including at the province's largest school board in Montreal.

The union said last week it was prepared to enter a more intense phase of negotiations in hopes of reaching an agreement.
