Traditional fundraising projects were a major problem this year, as all regular activities had to be cancelled. Local politicians - Sherbrooke mayor Lussier, Sherbrooke MNA Christine Labrie and Saint-François MNA Geneviève Hébert - stepped up

with some financial assistance, but the major funding this year came unexpectedly from the Fire Twenty-One Smokin' Grill food truck operated by a group of Sherbrooke firefighters, which brought in \$18,000 from a contract by hospital worker unions APTS and FIQ to visit each of the CIUSSS de l'Estrie-CHUS hospitals and to offer their members a free lunch in recognition for all their

dedicated work since March.
